As a consortium created in 2006 with a dedication to the acquisition, preservation, discovery and use of archives and historical documents on the Black experience throughout metropolitan Chicago, we recognize the importance of "Sankofa" as a guiding principle for our collective work. Sankofa – a word from the Akan language of Ghana, Africa – translates in English to "go back and get it."
